

### **Genders**

**Gender** refers to the roles, behaviors, and expectations that society associates with being male, female, or other identities.

# **Types of Gender:**

#### 1. Masculine Gender:

- The nouns that are associated with male characteristics.
- o Examples: "He," "man," "boy," "king," "actor."

### 2. Feminine Gender:

- The nouns that are associated with female characteristics.
- o Examples: "She," "woman," "girl," "queen," "actress."

### 3. Common Gender:

- The nouns that can be used for both males and females or when the gender is not specified.
- o Examples: "Teacher," "doctor," "student," "parent," "child."

### 4. Neuter Gender:

- o The nouns that are not associated with any gender (Non-Living).
- o Examples: "It," "car," "tree," "house," "book."

# **Examples of Usage**

- Masculine: "The king gave a speech."
- **Feminine:** "The **queen** waved to the crowd."
- **Common:** "The **doctor** will see you now." (Doctor can refer to any gender.)
- **Neuter:** "The **tree** is tall." (Tree is an inanimate object, so it's neuter.)

## **Rules of forming genders**

In English, forming feminine nouns from masculine ones follows some traditional patterns, though many of these are becoming less common in favor of gender-neutral language. Here are the key rules:

# 1. Adding a Suffix:

- **-ess**: The most common suffix used to form feminine nouns from masculine ones.
  - $\circ$  Actor  $\rightarrow$  Actress
  - $\circ$  Prince  $\rightarrow$  Princess
  - $\circ$  Host  $\rightarrow$  Hostess
  - $\circ$  Lion  $\rightarrow$  Lioness
- Note: The use of **-ess** is becoming less common in modern usage, with a preference for gender-neutral terms like "actor" for both male and female performers.



### 2. Different Word for Each Gender:

- Some words have entirely different forms for masculine and feminine:
  - $\circ$  King  $\rightarrow$  Queen
  - $\circ$  Duke  $\rightarrow$  Duchess
  - $\circ$  Bull  $\rightarrow$  Cow
  - $\circ$  Stallion  $\rightarrow$  Mare

# 3. Changing Prefixes or Suffixes:

- A few words use prefixes or other forms to indicate gender:
  - $\circ$  Heir  $\rightarrow$  Heiress
  - $\circ$  Emperor  $\rightarrow$  Empress

# 4. No Change (Same Word for Both Genders):

- Many modern English nouns have no gender distinction, and the same word is used for both masculine and feminine:
  - o Teacher, doctor, student, friend
  - o In such cases, the gender is often indicated by context or by using gender-specific pronouns (he/she) if necessary.

### **5. Feminine Titles and Forms:**

- Titles may change to reflect gender:
  - $\circ \quad Mr. \to Mrs./Ms.$
  - $\circ$  Sir  $\rightarrow$  Madam/Lady
  - $\circ$  Earl  $\rightarrow$  Countess
- Note: The trend is towards using titles that are the same for all genders, especially in professional settings.

### 6. Animals:

- For some animals, specific terms are used to denote the female:
  - $\circ$  Rooster  $\rightarrow$  Hen
  - o Dog → Bitch (although "female dog" is more commonly used)
  - $\circ$  Stallion  $\rightarrow$  Mare

### **Modern Trends:**

• There's a strong movement toward gender-neutral language, especially in professional roles and job titles. For example, "actor" is now commonly used for both men and women, and terms like "chairperson" replace "chairman" or "chairwoman."

In many cases, the choice to use or not use these forms depends on context, cultural norms, and personal preference.
